Seven Area Churches Open Doors for Freezing Nights

The days are getting shorter, the rains are here to stay, and the nighttime temperatures are dipping lower and lower. Freezing Nights, the Puyallup-based program serving the homeless will soon launch its third year, and First Christian Church will again be a host site, providing food and shelter on freezing nights.

Always determining the best ways to be effective, the ecumenical outreach ministry will have some changes this year: One is that Freezing Nights will take place any night the “feels like” temperature (at www.weather.com) drops to **32 degrees**. Another change is that **dinner will no longer be served** at the host sites. And, a record **seven Puyallup churches** will open their doors to the homeless as host sites!

What has not changed is that there is still a great need for volunteers and there is still a variety of ways to be a part of this important program witnessing the love of Jesus to those in need.

COUNTLESS WAYS TO HELP

- Donated supplies: Snack foods such as popcorn, chips, cookies; Beverages like decaf coffee, cocoa, and tea; Paper products (all paper please) hot drink cups, plates, napkins, and lunch sacks are welcomed.
- Each guest will get a hearty breakfast. We’ll need donations of food as well as people willing to prepare, serve, and/or clean up.
- After dinner at the Armory, guests will be shuttled by van from the pickup spot to the church sites each evening and back again in the morning. Morning and evening van drivers are needed.
- Each guest will be given a sack lunch to get them through the day. Can you come to pack the lunches?
- A callout to men is being given by Dan Aldridge, Freezing Nights Program Director, who asks men to step forward who might like to make a positive difference in the life of another man in need of a friend and champion.
- Grocery store gift cards (for church use) are always useful, as are cash donations. Make checks out to FCC Puyallup, designate *Freezing Nights* in the memo and leave in the offering plate or church office.
- Prepare the sanctuary by stacking and moving chairs, and/or help reset them in the mornings.
- Stay all night—sleep shifts are flexible for your needs.


PaTH (*Practicing and Teaching Hope*) Conversations toward Our Guiding Vision

Now the conversation circle is expanded—everyone is invited to participate. During our November worship services we will be listening to the draft guiding vision and considering how this emerging vision may call us to faithful ministry in the future.



Draft Guiding Vision

First Christian Church of Puyallup is a gathering of diverse individuals called by God to live as a blessing in our own neighborhoods and in the world.

We dream of being a faithful community of God's people whose spiritual practices of worship, prayer, study, and ministry nurture those who are seeking to live in the way of Jesus.

Believing that every follower of Christ is gifted by God, we dream of being a family in which each person discovers their gifts and is supported in sharing those gifts with the world.

We experience God's welcome in our celebration at the communion table and dream of being a reflection of that welcome in our acts of acceptance, forgiveness, generosity, and peacemaking.

General Minister and President speaks out on Health Care Issues

On October 2 Dr. Sharon Watkins joined other religious leaders to ask Congress to override a presidential veto of the H.R. 976, a reauthorization of the State Children's Health Insurance Program (SCHIP).

The SCHIP program is a joint federal-state initiative to provide health care coverage for children whose families earn above the limit to qualify for Medicaid coverage and too little to afford private medical care coverage.

At a news conference organized by Sojourners/Call to Renewal, an ecumenical faith-based movement to overcome poverty, Watkins gave her support to a resolution passed by the General Assembly at its recent gathering in Fort Worth, TX. In July 2007 the resolution called for healthcare solutions for the more than 9 million children without health insurance and the millions more who are underinsured. The resolution also urged Disciples to work as "advocates for children."

[update: On October 18, the House of Representatives fell 13 votes shy of overturning the presidential veto (votes 273 to 156). The Senate originally passed the legislation with 67 votes. How did your legislators vote? With the exception of Rep. Doc Hastings (Yakima), all Washington State representatives and senators voted for the SCHIP legislation.]

This year, don't rack up credit card debt, get swept up in the commercialism, or create waste. Instead, create holidays that instill more meaning into the season and encourage sharing, laughter, and personal renewal.

dreaming of a green Christmas?

- Americans have 25% more garbage from Thanksgiving to Christmas. This holiday give experience gifts—tickets to an event or admission to a museum keep gift wrap and packaging out of landfills.
- Use popcorn, not peanuts to ship gifts. Receive a gift with peanuts? Reuse or donate to a mailing store or Tacoma Recycle Center.
- Hosting a party? Buy food and drinks in bulk to minimize packaging, then recycle cans, glass or plastic bottles. Reuse or rent decorations.
- Give used sports gear made of recycled material, such as hiking shoes with recycled rubber soles, basketballs made with recycled rubber, ski jackets and sleeping bags made from recycled plastic.
- Send recycled-content greeting cards or make your own from scrap paper or by attaching new backs to the fronts of old cards.
- Home baked goodies packaged in reusable or recyclable containers show you care *and* reduce packaging waste.
- Potted plants, live bushes, shrubs, or trees can be planted in Spring.
- Use reusable cloth shopping bags and look for minimal packaging and recycled content (fleece from recycled plastic bottles, sneakers made with recycled rubber, or clothes from recycled cotton.)
